RESPONSE OF CITY OF BRISTOL TO POST HEARING BRIEF OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

The City of Bristol respectfully submits this response to the *Post Hearing Brief of the Attorney General* filed on April 8, 2002.

The issues and applicable law were discussed extensively by the Hearing Officer in his Order filed on February 15, 2002. The evidence presented by the City of Bristol at the hearing on March 14 is uncontroverted and establishes the following:

- 1. The 1999 amendment to the franchise agreement between United Cities Gas Company ("United Cities") and the City of Bristol ("Bristol") was the product of 2½ years of arms' length negotiations between the city and the gas company.
- 2. United Cities freely and voluntarily consented to the terms of the amended franchise and agreed to its terms.¹

¹ There is no merit to the Attorney General's assertion (page 2, lines 6-8) that Bristol threatened United Cities with the power of eminent domain. The record simply does not support such claim.

3. United Cities voluntarily initiated this proceeding seeking approval of the amended franchise agreement on the ground that the same is "fair, necessary, reasonable and proper to serve the public convenience and conserve[s] the public interest."

4. For the reasons shown in the voluminous record of this proceeding, the 1999 amended franchise agreement, as negotiated and approved by the duly elected representatives of the citizens of Bristol, is necessary and proper for the public convenience and properly conserves the public interest.

The City of Bristol relies on its *Proposed Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law*, filed and served on March 14, 2002, and respectfully asks the authority to adopt the same as it own. The amended franchise agreement should be approved.
