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INITIAL ORDER GRANTING CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY

This matter came before the Hearing Officer of the Tennessee Regulatory Authority (the "Authority" or "TRA") at a Hearing held on March 30, 2006, to consider the *Application for Certificate to Provide Competing Local Telecommunications Services* (the "Application") filed by NationsLine South, Inc. ("NationsLine") on January 25, 2006. In its *Application*, NationsLine seeks a certificate of public convenience and necessity ("CCN") for authority to provide competing local telecommunications services, including exchange access telecommunications services, within the State of Tennessee.

Legal Standard for Granting Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity

NationsLine's *Application* was made pursuant to, and was considered in light of, the criteria for granting a CCN as set forth in Tenn. Code Ann. § 65-4-201 (2004), which provides, in pertinent part:

(a) No public utility shall establish or begin the construction of, or operate any line, plant, or system, or route in or into a municipality or other territory already receiving a like service from another public utility, or establish service therein, without first having obtained from the authority,

after written application and hearing, a certificate that the present or future public convenience and necessity require or will require such construction, establishment, and operation, and no person or corporation not at the time a public utility shall commence the construction of any plant, line, system or route to be operated as a public utility, or the operation of which would constitute the same, or the owner or operator thereof, a public utility as defined by law, without having first obtained, in like manner, a similar certificate...

- (c) After notice to the incumbent local exchange telephone company and other interested parties and following a hearing, the authority shall grant a certificate of convenience and necessity to a competing telecommunications service provider if after examining the evidence presented, the authority finds:
- (1) The applicant has demonstrated that it will adhere to all applicable commission policies, rules and orders; and
- (2) The applicant possesses sufficient managerial, financial, and technical abilities to provide the applied for services.

(d) Subsection (c) is not applicable to areas served by an incumbent local exchange telephone company with fewer than 100,000 total access lines in this state unless such company voluntarily enters into an interconnection agreement with a competing telecommunications service provider or unless such incumbent local exchange telephone company applies for a certificate to provide telecommunications services in an area outside its service area existing on June 6, 1995.²

Furthermore, pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 65-5-112 (2004), a competing telecommunications provider is required to file with the Authority (1) a plan containing the provider's plan for purchasing goods and services from small and minority-owned telecommunications businesses; and (2) information on programs that might provide technical assistance to such businesses.

The March 30, 2006 Hearing

Pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 65-4-204 (2004), public notice of the Hearing in this matter was issued by the Hearing Officer on March 14, 2006. No persons sought intervention prior to or during the Hearing. At the Hearing held on March 30, 2006, Mr. Stephen Athanson, General Counsel for NationsLine, participated in the Hearing and was subject to examination by the Hearing Officer. Upon NationsLine's conclusion of the presentation of its proof, the Hearing Officer granted NationsLine's Application based upon the following findings of fact and conclusions of law:

I. NationsLine South, Inc.'s Qualifications

- 1. NationsLine is a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Virginia on March 29, 2004, and was qualified to transact business in the State of Tennessee on January 10, 2006.
- 2. The complete street address of NationsLine's registered agent is National Registered Agents, Inc., 1900 Church Street, Suite 400, Nashville, Tennessee 37203. - 3. The Application and supporting documentary information existing in the record indicate that NationsLine has the requisite technical and managerial ability to provide competitive access services and transport telecommunications services within the State of

Tennessee. Specifically, NationsLine's senior management team possesses extensive business, technical, operational and regulatory telecommunications experience.

- 4. NationsLine has the necessary capital and financial ability to provide the services it proposes to offer.
- 5. NationsLine has represented that it will adhere to all applicable statutes, policies, rules and orders of the Authority.

II. Proposed Services

NationsLine intends to offer a broad range of telecommunications services, primarily to residential customers, through the use of its own facilities, resold facilities and through a combination of these methods. NationsLine's initial line of local services will be comparable to those services currently offered by the incumbent LECs. Initially, NationsLine plans to offer basic access line service, DID Services, Optional Calling Features, Directory Assistance, Directory Services and Operator Services.

III. Permitting Competition to Serve the Public Convenience and Necessity

Upon a review of the *Application* and the record in this matter, the Hearing Officer finds that approval of NationsLine's *Application* would inure to the benefit of the present and future public convenience by permitting competition in the telecommunications services markets in the State and by fostering the development of an efficient, technologically advanced statewide system of telecommunications services.

IV. Small and Minority-Owned Telecommunications Business Participation Plan and Business Assistance Program

NationsLine has filed a satisfactory small and minority-owned telecommunications business participation plan, pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 65-5-112 (2004) and the Authority's Rules.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED THAT:

- 1. The Application for Certificate to Provide Competing Local Telecommunications Services filed by NationsLine South, Inc. is approved; and
- 2. Any party aggrieved by the Hearing Officer's decision in this matter may file a petition for reconsideration within fifteen (15) days from and after the date of this Order.
