

New phone app helps to locate fresh produce

"Phoning it in" is not necessarily a bad thing, at least when it comes to putting local foods on the table.

"Not everybody can be a farmer, but everybody can find farms, farmers markets and pick-your-own patches nearby," says Pamela Bartholomew, agritourism coordinator with the Tennessee Department of Agriculture. "Smart phone scanners make finding fresh, local foods so easy, you can literally phone it in!" Savvy cell phone users can now point their phone cameras at a "QR," or "quick response" code, and launch an application that takes them straight to the

Pick Tennessee Products website. Once the code has been scanned, shoppers can instantly access directories for local farmers markets, CSA (community supported agriculture) farms, and pick-your-own patches and orchards.

The website features fruits, vegetables and other local and artisan products during the seasons they're available in Tennessee. "The key to eating local is being aware that every fruit and vegetable has its own right time for growth and harvest," says Bartholomew. "The modern grocery store creates the illusion that all foods are available all the time, all

year round. If you want to eat local, you need to know there's no point looking for fresh Tennessee green beans in January. "Green beans are typically available just about everywhere in Tennessee in July. Watermelons? July, if you're lucky, but August, for sure. Sweet potatoes? October. Some crops, called 'cool weather' crops, actually get two seasons in Tennessee, which are spring and fall. Right now, all sorts of cool weather crops like cabbage, lettuce, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, peas, onions and potatoes are becoming plentiful." The website's new 'growing seasons' chart is our

most comprehensive ever," says Bartholomew. To see the chart, visit www.picktnproducts.org, click on "food," and then go to "fruits and vegetables." From there, click on "growing seasons." The Pick Tennessee Products site also offers a collection of seasonal recipes made with Tennessee grown and processed foods. The latest recipe, "Blue Cheese and Bacon Coleslaw," features fresh local cabbage, which is available now.

Pick Tennessee Products is the statewide campaign developed by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture to help consumers find Tennessee

farms, farm products and foods processed in Tennessee. More than 1,600 farmers and about 7,000 products, services and events are currently listed at the site.

Blue Cheese and Bacon Coleslaw

Yield: 10 servings
1 head fresh shredded cabbage or 1 (16-ounce)

package coleslaw mix
1 cup crumbled blue cheese
8 bacon slices, cooked and crumbled
3/4 cup mayonnaise
2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
1 tablespoon honey
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon black pepper

In a large bowl, toss together the coleslaw mix, cheese, and bacon. In a separate small bowl, whisk together the mayonnaise, vinegar, honey, salt, and pepper. Gently toss over the coleslaw mixture. Cover and refrigerate at least 30 minutes before serving.

New benefits For unemployed veterans

Veterans May Qualify For Additional Education Benefits

The Veterans Retraining Assistance Program (VRAP) offers 12 months of retraining assistance to veterans who are:

- Unemployed
- At least 35 but no more than 60 years old
- Have an other than dishonorable discharge
- Not eligible for any other VA education benefit program (e.g., the Post 9/11 GI Bill, Montgomery GI Bill, Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment)
- Not in receipt of VA

compensation due to Individual Unemployment (IU)

• Not enrolled in a federal or state job training program
• Enrolled in a VA approved program of education offered by a community college or technical school
The program is limited to 45,000 participants from July 1 through September 30, and to 54,000 participants from October 1, 2012, through March 31, 2014. Participants may receive up to 12 months of assistance at the full-time payment rate under the Montgomery GI Bill-Active Duty program (currently

81,473 per month). The program must lead to an Associate Degree, Non-College Degree, or a Certification, and train the veteran for a high demand occupation. Visit www.gibill.va.gov/VRAP to learn more and read frequently asked questions about VRAP. More details about VRAP, including information on how to apply, will be published. Participants may visit www.gibill.va.gov as they become available. VETERANS WITH A SERVICE-CONNECTED DIS-

ABILITY MAY QUALIFY FOR ADDITIONAL VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION AND EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS. Veterans who previously completed a VA vocational rehabilitation program and have used the initial 26 weeks of unemployment benefits may qualify for an additional 12 months of VA vocational rehabilitation benefits. • They must have previously completed a VA Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment program and been considered "rehabilitated" by VA. • They must apply within

six months of using up your initial 26 weeks of unemployment benefits. You may still qualify for extended or emergency unemployment benefits. • Veterans can apply now, but cannot start any education or training until June 1 and must apply to VA by March 31, 2014. VA may offer incentive payments to encourage employers to hire and train program participants. • VA may be able to reimburse an employer up to one-half year annual salary for 6 months or longer. • This can provide vet-

erans with a competitive advantage with employers. • Veterans must apply and qualify for VA vocational rehabilitation benefits prior to being hired. State Senate gives final approval to prescription drug abuse legislation

The State Senate has given final approval to legislation that requires doctors or their designees to check Tennessee's Controlled Substance Monitoring Database before initially prescribing an opioid or benzodiazepine substance or at every six months thereafter for the same episode of treatment. Senate Bill 2253, sponsored by Senator Ken Yager (R-Harriman),

comes after a Tennessee Drug Diversion Task Force report showed 56 percent of patients who receive opioid prescriptions have filled another opioid prescription within the previous 30 days.

"Tennessee ranks second in the nation in regard to the overutilization of prescription pain medications, with an average of 20 Tennesseans losing their lives each week

from drug overdose," said Yager. "Last year, there were more deaths in Tennessee due to drug overdoses than motor vehicle accidents, homicide or suicide. This bill is a huge step in the right direction in curbing this major state health epidemic." Currently, Tennessee's database includes basic patient information, the identity of the prescribing practitioner, the pharmacy

that filled the prescription, and the name, amount and form of medication that the patient received. Although the database requires doctors, pharmacists or their designees to report, there is currently no requirement that they check the database before prescribing or dispensing scheduled pain pills. This legislation requires pharmacies to collect a patient's pre-

scription information and report that information to the database within seven days. Currently it must be reported within 40 days. The bill also enhances penalties for doctor shopping from a Class A misdemeanor offense to a Class E Felony when it involves 250 or more pills. The stiffer penalties allow law enforcement officials to go after dealers who distribute the drugs illegally.

"Prescription drug abuse has far-reaching effects on our state," added Yager. "It has touched virtually every family in Tennessee. I am very pleased this legislation has been approved and believe it will save many lives."

The bill awaits action in the House of Representatives before going to Governor Haslam for his signature.

Mountainside Coal Company, 7692 South Highway 25W, Williamsburg, Kentucky 40769 is applying for Phase I, II, and III bond release of the bonds posted for Increments 2 and 3 of Permit No. 3141, which was issued on November 18, 2004. The permitted surface area of Increments 2 and 3 consists of 158.5 acres. The Eagan Surface Mine No. 2 mine site is located in Campbell and Claiborne Counties, TN, on the Eagan, TN-KY U.S.G.S. quadrangle map at latitude N36° 31' 28" and longitude W83° 57' 34", approximately 1.7 miles south of the Eagan community. The collateral bond currently in effect for Increment 2 is \$477,400 and a bond release of \$477,400 is being requested. The collateral bond currently in effect for Increment 3 is \$333,500 and a bond release of \$333,500 is being requested. The bond release requests are based on completion of the following reclamation:

1. Backfilling, grading, seeding, and mulching of the disturbed areas has been completed. Trees and/or shrubs have been planted in the areas designated in the approved plans.
2. Backfilling, grading, seeding, and mulching of the disturbed areas was completed in May of 2008. Trees were planted in April of 2009.
3. The reclaimed mine site has been revegetated with grasses, legumes, shrubs, and trees, in accordance with the approved plans. The diverse vegetation supports the post mining land uses of undeveloped land and wildlife habitat.
4. The approved post mining land uses for this site are undeveloped land and wildlife habitat.

Written comments, objections, and requests for a public hearing or an informal conference may be submitted to the Office of Surface Mining, 710 Locust Street, Second Floor, Knoxville, Tennessee 37902 prior to June 25, 2012 which is 30 days following the last publication date.

NOTICE OF HEARING ON NAVITAS TN NG, LLC'S PETITION OF NAVITAS TN NG, LLC FOR AN ORDER GRANTING APPROVAL TO BOOK AS A REGULATORY ASSET ITS COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH ITS DISTRIBUTION INTEGRITY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Navitas TN NG, LLC has filed a Petition for an Order Granting Approval to Book as a Regulatory Asset its Costs Associated with its Distribution Integrity Management Program (DIMP) with the Tennessee Regulatory Authority (the "Authority") in Docket No. 2-00020. Since acquiring control of the gas utility systems of Gasco Distribution Systems, Inc. in Jellico, Campbell County, Byrdstown, Pickett County, and Fentress County, Tennessee and Whitley County, Kentucky, the system has continued to operate under the control of Navitas.

Navitas has two sub-systems in Tennessee, and Navitas must have a separate DIMP plan that meets the requirements of the Pipeline Inspection, Protection, Enforcement, and Safety Act of 2006 for each subsystem and other associated pipeline safety plans. The DIMP plans must be submitted to and approved by the Authority. Navitas' affiliated entities - Navitas KY NG, LLC in Kentucky and Fort Cobb Fuel Authority, L.L.C. and its LeAnn Division ("FCFA") in Oklahoma - also are required to submit separate DIMP plans for each sub-system in Kentucky (one sub-system) and Oklahoma (22 sub-systems) and approved by their respective public utility authorities. Due to the complexity of the plans and importance of ensuring that the plans are compliant with federal regulations, Navitas has retained an experienced consultant to assist in preparing the plans. Navitas intends to book the costs associated with retaining the consultant to perform this work as a regulatory asset and to amortize the booked amount over a five year period. The costs will be allocated based on a one dollar per customer/per month charge applied to each of Navitas' customers in Oklahoma, Kentucky and Tennessee over the five year period. Navitas intends to include the costs as a known and reasonable expense in its forthcoming rate case due to be filed on or before June 30, 2012.

The Petition has been set for hearing before the Authority at 1:00 p.m. on May 7, 2012 in the Hearing Room on the Ground Floor of the Tennessee Regulatory Authority at 480 James Robertson Parkway, Nashville Tennessee.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that all interested persons may appear at the Hearing and be heard, and that after the Hearing, the TRA, regardless of the relief requested in the Petition, shall issue such Order and grant such relief as it deems to be proper, necessary, fair, reasonable and equitable in the premises, whether or not specifically prayed for in the Petition.



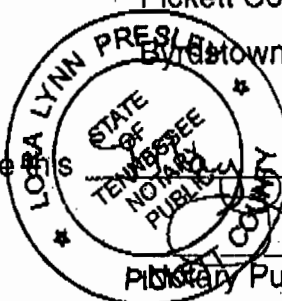
