

Dear Chairman Allison:

On February 11, 2014, AT&T Tennessee filed a letter in the above-captioned docket announcing that, effective immediately, the carrier will resume offering intrastate special access services under the terms and conditions set forth in the carrier's tariffs prior to December 10, 2013.1

In light of this decision by AT&T Tennessee, CompSouth withdraws its Complaint without prejudice to filing it or a similar complaint in the future should circumstances warrant. Although there are many questions and unresolved issues surrounding AT&T's claim that it intends to transition to an "all IP" network by 2020, the specific tariff filings which are the subject of this Complaint are now effectively moot.
